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Village to Remove All Emerald Ash Borer Trees

Orland Hills is in the process of removing all ash trees in the Village before this winter.

In October, 2012 the Village of Orland Hills completed an Urban Forestry Management Plan. Orland Hills was one of 13 towns selected by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to conduct an assessment of the street tree population. The reason for the plan was the presence of the Emerald Ash Borer.

A total of 3,034 public trees were inventoried in Orland Hills as part of the plan. Almost 1,000 (981) or approximately 33% of the Orland Hills street tree population consisted of green and white ash trees which are susceptible to the Emerald Ash Borer. The percentage of ash trees in Orland Hills is relatively high for the Chicago area.

The removal of dead and dying ash trees in Orland Hills has been addressed in an orderly fashion over the last four years. During that time, Mayor Hastings and the Village Board have directed the Public Works Department to coordinate the cutting and stump removal of all ash trees.

"This is a tragic and serious condition for our Village", Mayor Kyle Hastings said. "The aesthetic beauty, memories of the trees, cost, and environmental impact have drastically affected our town."

The Village has a complete list and knows the location of all the ash trees in the Village. It is not necessary to call the Village Hall if you have a dead or dying ash tree in your parkway; the tree will be removed.

Please remember that even though some of the ash trees appear to still be in good shape and look as if they will come back, the Village is removing all of the trees in an orderly fashion and will complete the removal all of the ash trees by winter.

Tree replacement has begun with grant funds made available from the Morton Arboretum for the purchase of new trees. Trees have already been planted along 167th Street. In the next eight weeks, trees will be planted along Meadowview Avenue. Plans are underway for additional plantings.

Our overall goal of removing the ash trees and planting replacements is to promote a healthy, diverse, safe and sustainable urban forest that benefits the current and future residents of Orland Hills.

Orland Hills Receives Money to Replace Ash Trees

The Village of Orland Hills recently received a grant of \$10,000 to purchase and plant trees that have been removed due to infestation by the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). Infected and dead trees continue to be removed by the Public Works Department as part of the local-match for the grant funds.

Funds are being made available from the U.S. EPA Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and the Morton Arboretum.

"This is just one of the ways we bring in money to help Orland Hills strengthen and support our existing comprehensive public tree care program," said Mayor Hastings.

The grant is intended to assist communities in the management of their urban forest resources that are threatened and impacted by the (EAB). Orland Hills had

almost 1,000 green and white ash trees on our parkways making up roughly 33 percent of the entire Village street tree inventory. It is the intention of Mayor Hastings and the Village board to remove all ash trees in the Village before winter


As part of the grant application, the Village was assisted by a Certified Arborist who has reviewed the various species of trees that the Village intends to plant. Recommended trees which are listed in the Village Tree Code and are part of the grant award will include oak, hackberry, lindens, honey locust and a few other varieties.

The trees to be purchased with the new grant money will be planted in the fall on Village parkways and public areas where infected trees have been removed.

Mayor Hastings Hosts Congressman Rush Workshop

Mayor Kyle R. Hastings recently hosted a workshop at the Village Hall which was sponsored by Congressman Bobby Rush. The workshop was held to discuss and learn about the new transportation bill that was passed by Congress last year. The bill will improve the Nation's infrastructure. The bill provides \$305 billion in funding for highway, transit and transportation improvements over the next five years.

The workshop provided local officials with relevant information on funding levels, policy changes and new programs under the FAST Act. The Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act can benefit Orland Hills with funds for critical transportation projects.

The Village staff is currently assembling a grant application for funds to rehabilitate and expand bicycle trails and pedestrian paths throughout Orland Hills, including the paths surrounding Lake Lorin and Ashbourne Lake.

Street Resurfacing Begins In The Summer

Mayor Kyle Hastings has announced the street resurfacing in the Village of Orland Hills.

The streets that will be resurfaced are Highview, Hilltop, and 93rd Avenue. These three streets have been targeted for infrastructure improvement. All of the roads will be projected for repair during the summer of 2016.

Mayor Hastings said, "While we continue to wait for funding from the State of Illinois, our Village has saved money to begin the infrastructure improvement. We have to be proactive rather than waiting for money that was promised." Additional streets will be announced for the 2017 street resurfacing during the spring of next year.

"We are still waiting for the Governor to release the grant money which was allocated to Orland Hills for the north side of town. Once the grant is released, we will start the street repairs," Mayor Hastings added.

Letters will be delivered to all homes prior to the construction of the streets. These letters will update you of the dates and requests from the construction company. If you have any questions during the improvements, contact the Village Hall at any time.



I have heard that sitting is considered the new smoking. Why so?- Ken N

Unfortunately Ken, research is finding that a sedentary lifestyle may be even more harmful than smoking. The negative effects occur at the molecular level, raising blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar and toxicity levels while reducing arterial dilation, blood flow and fat-burning enzymes that promote weight gain. Mailbox Guidelines From USPS

From the wear and tear of daily use to constant assault from the elements, these guidelines will help you set up a mailbox that stands up to it all.

If you are buying a new mailbox, look for the Postmaster General's seal of approval; every new mailbox designed should be reviewed and approved before it goes to market. Always run your plans by your local postmaster. Overall, the mailbox you build will need to meet the same size, strength, and quality standards as manufactured boxes. The house numbers should clearly be displayed on your mailbox.

Put a roadside mailbox where a carrier can safely reach inside without leaving the truck. That means positioning it about 41'' to 45'' off the ground and back about 6'' to 8''from the curb.




Diagram shows positioning of a roadside mailbox

A Friendly Reminder, Again and Again PLEASE PICK UP YOUR DOG'S POOP!!!

As everyone is outside enjoying the weather, please help and keep our great parks clean and beautiful by throwing your garbage away. Cans are distributed throughout the parks for your convenience. While walking your dogs, we are asking that you *clean up* after them! All dogs must be walked on a leash. ALSO, we have been having a problem with cats!! Please do not let your cats roam as the Village has received many complaints on cat poop as well!! (Who would of thought?)

Dog owners/Cat owners please do NOT let your dogs/cats dump on any of the Village's paths or on other resident's lawns. One of our biggest complaints this past year was that people are not picking up after their dogs!! Not only is that un-neighborly, it is unlawful and rude. To make it easier for everyone just **bring a plastic bag** with you and **pick up** after your dog!!! AND cat!!! There are potential health risks that can come from being unsanitary. Parasites in dog waste can be transferred to other dogs and even humans, especially children. Visceral and ocular larva are parasite infections that occur in the intestines of cats and dogs. They can be spread from animal stool to other animals and people. Sure it seems unlikely anyone or anything willingly would ingest another animal's excrement until you consider

this; Dogs often lick their paws clean after a walk outdoors. Children are on the ground playing, dirty hands frequently end in mouths. As a result, humans and dogs can end up with roundworms or hookworms. So... Isn't it just easier to bring a plastic bag with you and just pick up the poop?



Dear Resident,

In the Village of Orland Hills it is prohibited to alter side and rear yard drainage easements and swales. The easements and swales are engineered to carry storm water to sewers and detention ponds. The elevations and grades are to be left as they were originally intended. Except for grass, no other landscaping, gardens, or building is allowed. Easements and swales that were altered should be returned to their original and intended condition.

All work over \$100.00 in value requires a permit. Examples of projects that require permits include fences, sheds, pools, decks, patios, walks, sprinkler systems, retaining walls and driveways. Any additions or alterations in electrical or plumbing work must be installed to code and also requires a permit.

All residents that own dogs and cats over four months of age need to get a pet license tag for their pet. Just bring the valid rabies vaccination certificate from a registered veterinarian showing the animal has been inoculated. Fees are as follows:

Spayed or Neutered \$2.50 Not Spayed or Not Neutered \$4.00

Therefore, when you are coming in for your vehicle sticker in June or July, license your animals too!!

Did you know that the length around Lake Lorin is 4821 feet? In walking distance that equals .92 miles. The length around Ashbourne Lake is 3078 feet and is .59 miles. That is something that we just wanted our walkers and runners to know! Now you know!



Keys To Good Pruning

- 1. Prune early in the life of the tree so pruning wounds are small and growth goes where you want it.
- 2. Begin your visual inspection at the top of the tree and work downward.
- 3. Identify the best leader and lateral branches before you begin pruning to remove defective parts before pruning for form.
- 4. Don't worry about protecting pruning cuts. For aesthetics, you may feel better painting larger wounds with neutral color tree paint, but the evidence is that it does not prevent or reduce decay.
- 5. Keep your tools sharp. One hand pruning shears with curved blades works best on young trees.
- 6. Make safety a number one priority. For high branches use a pole pruner that has a saw and shears on the same tool. A major job on a big tree should be done by a professional arborist.
- 7. When you prune back to the trunk or a larger limb, branches too small to have formed a collar (swollen area at base) should be cut loose. Prune larger limbs by cutting just outside the branch ridge and collar and at a slight down and outward angle.
- 8. When simply shortening a small branch, make the cut at a lateral bud or another lateral branch. Favor a bud that will produce a branch that will grow in a desired direction (usually outward). The cut should be sharp and clean, and made at a slight angle about ¼ inch beyond the bud.

When To Prune

Winter: Pruning during dormancy is the most common practice. It results in vigorous burst of new growth in the spring and should be used if that is the desired effect. It is usually best to wait until the coldest part of winter has passed. Some species, such as maple, walnuts and birches, may "bleed" when the sap begins to flow. This is not harmful and will cease when the tree leafs out.

Summer: To direct the growth by slowing the branches you don't want; or to slow or "dwarf" the development of a tree or branch, pruning should be done soon after seasonal growth is complete. The reason for the slowing effect is that you reduce the total leaf surface, thereby reducing the amount of food manufactured and sent to the roots for their development and next year's growth of the crown.

Fall: Because decay fungi spread their spores profusely in the fall and healing of wounds seems to be slower on fall cuts, this is a good time to leave your pruning tools in storage.

Flowering Trees: If your purpose for pruning is to enhance flowering: 1. For trees or shrubs that bloom in summer or fall on current year's growth, prune in winter. 2. For trees that bloom in spring from buds on one year old wood (flowering fruit trees), prune when their flowers fade.

Home Improvements

The Building Department is located in the Village Complex, upper level at 16033 S. 94th Avenue. The Village of Orland Hills is always happy to see home improvements! Not only does it add value to your home but also to the homes around you. In order to serve you better, please read the following guidelines prior to making these improvements:

How to go about getting a Building Permit

- 1. Applications are available to apply for a permit at the Village Hall. Applications can also be downloaded from (www.orlandhills.org)
- 2. Complete all information requested on the application (no blank spaces) and submit, if requested, 4 sets of detailed plans and a plat of survey. Plats of survey must be marked with the location of the construction project. Example: Mark on your plat where your patio will be located.
- 3. Make sure the contractor you have selected is licensed, bonded and insured with the Village of Orland Hills prior to applying for your permit. (If this is not completed, this can sometimes prolong the processing of your permit.) It is important that you tell the contractor up front that he needs to be licensed with the village.
- 4. Once all paperwork is properly filled out and submitted wait time is approximately 4 7 business days.
- 5. Absolutely no work is to be started prior to permit approval..
- 6. The Building Department will contact you when your permit has been approved and is available for pick up.
- 7. Place the permit card in a window that is visible to the street and begin your improvement!

How to go about getting an Inspection

ALL INSPECTIONS MUST BE CALLED IN 24HRS IN ADVANCE.



- 1. All inspections are marked on the inspection sheet accompanying your permit when the permit card is picked up.
- 2. Simply call the Building Department and schedule an inspection 24hrs prior.
- 3. Building Department phone number is 708/349-4887.
- 4. Most contractors know in advance when they will be at your house to begin work and an approximate time of when an inspection will need to be done.
- 5. If you are doing the work yourself, please call and give us as much advance notice as possible. The Building Department understands the limited time people have to do home improvements. However, we also don't like to be taken advantage of. Just call... we are willing to work with you.

Call Julie Before You Dig

Today, more utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. With this in mind, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before any digging projects and stressing safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."



Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mailbox post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE, Inc. promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the entire state of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

- 1. Call **JULIE (1-800-892-0123)** before you dig
- 2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- 3. Respect the marks
- 4. Dig with care
