Mayor Hastings Unveils Another Major Infrastructure Project

Mayor Kyle R. Hastings introduced a major infrastructure road improvement in Orland Hills on January 25, 2012 with residents in our town. The Haven Avenue project will be the street targeted for the second largest project for road reconstruction in Orland Hills history, next to the 88th Avenue project from last year.

The Haven Avenue project will begin in early May 2013, with minor surveying work for the layout of the project. Major reconstruction will begin in mid to late May with the street being widened one foot on each side of the street. Haven Avenue will have new curbs, all driveway entrances will have depressed curbs. In addition the mail boxes will all be located on the west side of the street and they will be moved to accommodate the widening. Also, planting of new parkway trees, where needed and more road and storm sewer enhancements will take place. All residents on Haven Avenue are being asked to select their choice of

trees, from the five different approved selections, at the Village Hall.

The Haven Avenue project begins at 159th Street and ends at Meadowview Drive.

The cost for this enhancement will be \$1,250,000.00. The majority of this money will be coming from federal funds for infrastructure development. Approximately \$375,000.00 will come from the state motor fuel tax monies, and the rest will be generated from the Federal Surface Transportation Grant.

Mayor Hastings said, "I am very proud to acquire another grant of \$875,000.00 from the federal and state agencies. There was a competitive process and once again, Orland Hills is the town selected for these well deserved funds. This is another historic event for our town by obtaining dollars to beautify our community."

During the process of redevelopment, there will be individual mailings to all residents on Haven Avenue. The mailings will update our neighbors on the progress and various construction events, which will happen in the future.

This major street enhancement will be the first "improvement" since the original road was developed, in the 1960's. Once the repairs are finished, the Haven Avenue area will look like a new development in the Village of Orland Hills.



Waste Removal Services

We are entering into the last year of our current five-year contract for refuse collection services with Waste Management. May 1st of each year marks the planned change to their billing rate. Our new rate for this year is \$22.35.

This service includes curbside pickup of all recyclable materials (excluding electronic waste and household hazardous waste), garbage and yard waste. The contracted rate which each houshold pays includes street sweeping services on the first Tuesday of the month, containers for special events such as Spring Cleanup, emergency pickup services of debris from severe storms, tree branch pickup (if bundled in four foot lengths and 40 pounds maximum per

bundle), a toter for garbage and one for recycling, just to name a few. It does not include removal of remodeling project debris or construction occupation debris collections.

Electronic waste is handled through a dropoff program at public works on stated dates each quarter (July 14, 2012, October 13, 2012 and January 12, 2013). Our contractor for this service is Vintage Tech Recyclers, Inc. They offer a scheduled pickup service at your door by calling 630-305-0922, if you miss the quarterly drop-off date.


The Easter Bunny led each age group around the track while the eggs were scattered and the hunt was on. Two golden eggs per age group were dropped and those win-


ners received a special treat. The



Do Not Dump Lawn Clippings

Please remember that when you are cutting your lawn, the Public Works Department requests residents not to dump lawn clippings or any other debris in or around retention ponds or Village lakes. When debris is dumped, it blocks the water flow, which can result in flooding! If a resident should witness anyone dumping such debris, please call the Village Hall or Police Department. You can remain anonymous but give the address of the person or persons dumping debris, so a warning can be issued. We all need to take a part in keeping our Village clean of debris and the storm water flowing to prevent flooding. Your help is much appreciated.

Spring Cleaning!

Spring is here! Flowers and trees are in bloom and the weather is just beautiful. Springtime usually means clean up time. We all would like our houses to look nice and neat now that everyone is out and about during the nicer weather. Here is a guide to check your home. Remember, property maintenance does not have to be costly and it increases Village property values.



First, look at the outside of your home. Is your home in good repair? Is it weather tight?

- **Windows:** weather tight, sash fits, unbroken glass, proper glazing;
- Doors: weather tight, rodent proof, secure hinges and locks;
- **Walls:** no holes or large cracks, soffit and fascia in good repair;
- Paint: wood and metal surfaces protected, no peeling;
- Gutters and Downspouts: free of leaves, no leaks, clean;
- **Foundation:** sound, no holes or cracks;
- Steps: not worn, evenly spaced, handrail in good repair;
- **Roof:** free of leaks, shingles in good repair;
- **Porch:** good repair, guard rails;
- **Chimney:** clean, flue intact, tuckpointing in good condition;
- **Outside:** no trash in street curb, grass and weeds cut, no trash or litter in yard, no abandoned or unregistered vehicles or parts laying around on property, garage and shed in good condition;
- **Abandoned appliances:** door removed, all locking devices removed, and a call to Waste Management to come and pick it up at the curb;
- **Trash:** proper containers, tight fitting lids, covered at all times and brought out to the
- curbside on Thursday for garbage day.

 Mailbox: good repair, follows postmasters guide to height and setback.

Now, check your home on the inside. Is the house clean, safe and well maintained?

- **Walls and Ceilings:** clean, no lose paper or plaster, no cracks or flaking paint, no lead paint;
- **Windows:** no broken or cracked glass, opens freely with screens;
- Doors: secure, not blocked, proper hardware;
- **Water Heater:** should heat to 110 degrees F, properly vented, temperature and pressure relief, valves installed properly;
- **Floors:** sound and clean, no holes or lose flooring;
- **Hallways:** well lighted, clear, approved working smoke detector;
- Electrical: adequate service, no frayed wires or cords, no broken fixtures or outlets;
- Heating: should heat to 65 degrees F, properly installed, free from leaks, clean filters regularly.

For your own protection, before making extensive repairs or alterations:

- Be sure they meet the requirements of the building and zoning codes. Obtain building permits if required.
- Secure advice and estimates from reliable tradesmen. Obtain more than one estimate for the work.
- A list of licensed and bonded contractors can be obtained from the Building Department at 349-4887.

Be Prepared for Spring and Summer Storms

Spring and Summer rains can bring flash floods. Don't get flooded and don't make flooding worse by dumping in the drainageways or obstructing drainage along your lot line. Here are some things to keep in mind:

Check with the Building Department (349-6666) on the extent of flooding in your area.

Keep Your Easement Open: One of the biggest causes of flooding problems in Orland Hills has been obstructions built or placed in the drainage easements that were established along lot lines. These areas were set aside to carry water away from your house without flooding your neighbors. Keep them open.



Prepare for flooding by doing the following:

- Mark your fuse or breaker box to show the circuits to the floodable areas.
- Know how to shut off the electricity and gas to your house when a flood comes.
- Make a list of emergency numbers and identify a safe place to go to.
- Make a household inventory, especially of basement contents.
- Put insurance policies, valuable papers, medicine, etc. in a safe place.
- Develop a disaster response plan. The Red Cross and fema.gov have helpful brochures and useful information.
- Put cleaning supplies, batteries, camera, waterproof boots, etc. in a safe place.

Tornado Safety Tips

From Mayor Kyle R. Hastings and the Village Board

It's important to know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning. A tornado watch means that atmospheric conditions are such that a tornado could develop. A tornado warning means that an actual tornado has been sighted in the area.

- When the sky looks threatening, tune in an AM radio station, such as WMAQ-670, WGN-720 or WBBM-780 and listen for emergency weather information.
- Listen for the Orland Park outdoor warning siren system. An actual tornado warning is a three to five-minute steady blast. This means that a tornado has been sighted in the area, and you should take cover immediately. The Village of Orland Park outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Tuesday of each month at approximately 10:30 a.m. with one minute steady, one minute silence and one minute steady.
- If at home, stay away from windows, outside walls and exterior doors. If possible, go to a basement. If not, go to a small room, such as a closet or bathroom, in the center of a home on the lowest level.
- If in a school, stay away from windows and gymnasiums or other areas with wide roofs that could easily collapse.
- If in a shopping center or large building, look for a pre-designated shelter or go to a middle hallway on the lowest floor, staying away from skylights.
- If you are in a car, leave it and find shelter. If none is found, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert, and cover your head with your hands.



Remember these flood safety precautions:

Flood Safety Outdoors

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number-one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive. Six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Use a pole or stick to ensure that the ground is still there before you go through an area where the water is not flowing.

Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than any¬where else. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. A car can float in as little as two feet of water.

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to Commonwealth Edison at 1-800/334-7661 ("1-800/Edison-1").

Flood Safety Indoors

Turn off your electricity if your building is flooded. If you don't feel safe doing this, call an electrician. Some appliances, such as television sets, can shock you even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances or motors that have gotten wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned, dried and inspected by a professional.

Watch for animals. Small animals like rats and snakes that have been flooded out of their homes may seek shelter in yours. Use a pole or stick to poke and turn items over and scare away small animals.

Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns, or open flames unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been thoroughly aired out. If you have questions on gas, call 1-888/642-6748 ("1-888/NICOR4U").

Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline-powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Fumes from charcoal are especially deadly — cook with charcoal outdoors.

Clean everything that got wet. Flood waters have picked up sewage and chemicals from roads, farms, factories, and storage buildings. Spoiled food and flooded cosmetics and medicines are health hazards. When in doubt, throw them out.

Take good care of yourself. Wear gloves and boots. Wash your hands frequently during clean up. Recovering from a flood is a big job. It is tough on both the body and spirit and the effects a disaster has on you and your family may last a long time. Keep your eyes open for signs of anxiety, stress, and fatigue in you and your family.

You can protect yourself from flooding

The Building Department in the Village Hall (349-6666) can help you with:

- Information on whether a property is in a mapped floodplain and related Flood Insurance Rate Map data;
- Records of past flooding;
- Information and copies of past Elevation Certificates;
- Free copies of the Village's Guide to Flood Protection;
- Advice on how to protect a building from water problems;
- Guidance on the laws that govern construction and property improvements; and
- Site visits to view the cause and possible solutions to a problem.

Flood maps and flood protection references are also available at the Tinley Park Public Library.



Part-Time Public Works

The Village of Orland Hills Public Works Department is seeking PART-TIME applicants. Applicants must be able to work various hours and be able to lift a minimum of 50 lbs. Responsibilities are to assist the Public Works Department with general building maintenance, park maintenance, and ditch and retention pond maintenance along with other various job duties. Applicants will be required to work either 7:30am – 11:30am or 12:00pm – 4:00pm, Mon. – Fri., from the end of May through the end of August. Hourly wage is \$8.25 per hour.

Did You Know A Pet License Is Required?

All dogs and cats over four months of age need to get a pet license tag for their dog/cat. Just bring the valid rabies vaccination certificate by a registered veterinarian showing the animal has been inoculated. Fees are as follows:

Spayed or Neutered.....\$2.50 Not Spayed or

Not Neutered.....\$4.00

Therefore, when you are coming in for your vehicle sticker in June or July, license your animals too!!

Limit on Pets:

It is hereby declared a nuisance and shall be unlawful for any person to own more than five (5) dogs, or any combination of dogs and cats totaling five (5).

A Friendly Reminder Again and Again

Soon everyone will be out enjoying the nice weather, please help and keep our great parks clean and beautiful by throwing your garbage away. Cans are distributed throughout the parks for your convenience. While walking your dogs, we are asking that you **clean up** after them! All dogs must be walked on a leash. ALSO, we have been having a problem with cats!! Please do not let your cats roam as the Village has received many complaints on cat poop as well!!

Dog owners/Cat owners please do NOT let your dogs/cats dump on any of the Village's paths or on other resident's lawns. One of our biggest complaints this past year was that people are not picking up after their dogs!! Not only is that un-neighborly, it is unlawful and rude. To make it easier for everyone just **bring a plastic bag** with you and **pick up** after your dog!!! AND cat!!!

There are potential health risks that can come from being unsanitary. Parasites in dog waste can be transferred to other dogs and even humans, especially children. Visceral and ocular larva are parasite infections that occur in the intestines of cats and dogs. They can be spread from animal stool to other animals and people. Sure it seems unlikely anyone or anything willingly would

ingest another animal's excrement until you consider this; Dogs often lick their paws clean after a walk outdoors. Children are on the ground playing, dirty hands frequently end in mouths. As a result, humans and dogs can end up with roundworms or hookworms. So... Isn't it just easier to bring a plastic bag with you and just pick up the poop?

Building Department

Dear Resident,

In the Village of Orland Hills it is prohibited to alter side and rear yard drainage easements and swales. The easements and swales are engineered to carry storm water to sewers and detention ponds. The elevations and grades are to be left as they were originally intended. Except for grass, no other landscaping, gardens, or building is allowed. Easements and swales that were altered should be returned to their original and intended condition.

All work over \$100.00 in value requires a permit. Examples of projects that require permits include fences, sheds, pools, decks, patios, walks, sprinkler systems, retaining walls and air conditioners. Any additions or alterations in electrical or plumbing work must be installed to code and also requires a permit.

Keys To Good Pruning

- 1. Prune early in the life of the tree so pruning wounds are small and growth goes where you want it.
- 2. Begin your visual inspection at the top of the tree and work downward.
- 3. Identify the best leader and lateral branches before you begin pruning to remove defective parts before pruning for form.
- Don't worry about protecting pruning cuts. For aesthetics, you may feel better painting larger wounds with neutral color tree paint, but the evidence is that it does not prevent or reduce decay.
- 5. Keep your tools sharp. One hand pruning shears with curved blades works best on young trees.
- Make safety a number one priority. For high branches use a pole pruner that has a saw and shears on the same tool. A major job on a big tree should be done by a professional arborist.
- 7. When you prune back to the trunk or a larger limb, branches too small to have formed a collar (swollen area at base) should be cut loose. Prune larger limbs by cutting just outside the branch ridge and collar and at a slight down and outward angle.
- 8. When simply shortening a small branch, make the cut at a lateral bud or another lateral branch. Favor a bud that will produce a branch that will grow in a desired direction (usually outward). The cut should be sharp and clean, and made at a slight angle about ¼ inch beyond the bud.

When To Prune

Winter: Pruning during dormancy is the most common practice. It results in vigorous burst of new growth in the spring and should be used if that is the desired effect. It is usually best to wait until the coldest part of winter has passed. Some species, such as maple, walnuts and birches, may "bleed" when the sap begins to flow. This is not harmful and will cease when the tree leafs out.

Summer: To direct the growth by slowing the branches you don't want; or to slow or "dwarf" the development of a tree or branch, pruning should be done soon after seasonal growth is complete. The reason for the slowing effect is that you reduce the total leaf surface, thereby reducing the amount of food manufactured and sent to the roots for their development and next year's growth of the crown.

Fall: Because decay fungi spread their spores profusely in the fall and healing of wounds seems to be slower on fall cuts, this is a good time to leave your pruning tools in storage.

Flowering Trees: Ilf your purpose for pruning is to enhance flowering:

- 1. For trees or shrubs that bloom in summer or fall on current year's growth, prune in winter.
- 2. For trees that bloom in spring from buds on one year old wood (flowering fruit trees), prune when their flowers fade.

Home Improvements

The Building Department is located in the Village Complex, upper level at 16033 S. 94th Avenue. The Village of Orland Hills is always happy to see home improvements! Not only does it add value to your home but also to the homes around you. In order to serve you better, please read the following guidelines prior to making these improvements:

HOW TO GO ABOUT GETTING A BUILDING PERMIT?

- ▶ Applications are available to apply for a permit at the Village Hall. Applications can also be downloaded from (www.orlandhills.org)
- ▶ Complete all information requested on the application (no blank spaces) and submit, if requested, 4 sets of detailed plans and a plat of survey. Plats of survey must be marked with the location of the construction project. Example: Mark on your plat where your patio will be located.
- Make sure the contractor you have selected is licensed, bonded and insured with the Village of Orland Hills prior to applying for your permit. (If this is not completed, this can sometimes prolong the processing of your permit.) It is important that you tell the contractor up front that he needs to be licensed with the village. Contractor applications can be downloaded from (www.orlandhills.org)
- ♦ Once all paperwork is properly filled out and submitted, wait time is approximately 4 7 business days when it's busy.
- ♦ Absolutely no work is to be started prior to permit approval.
- ▶ The Building Department will contact you when your permit has been approved and is available for pick up.
- Place the permit card in a window that is visible to the street and begin your improvement!

HOW TO GO ABOUT GETTING AN INSPECTION? ALL INSPECTIONS MUST BE CALLED IN 24HRS IN ADVANCE.

- ▶ All inspections are marked on the inspection sheet accompanying your permit when the permit card is picked up.
- Simply call the Building Department and schedule an inspection 24hrs prior.
- ▶ Building Department phone number is 708/349-4887.
- Most contractors know in advance when they will be at your house to begin work and an approximate time of when an inspection will need to be done.
- ▶ If you are doing the work yourself, please call and give us as much advance notice as possible. The Building Department understands the limited time people have to do home improvements and will work with you on your project.

Call Julie Before You Dig

Today, more utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. With this in mind, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before any digging projects and stressing safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."



TYPES OF OUTDOOR PROJECTS

Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mail-box post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their under-

ground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE, Inc. promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the entire state of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

- 1. Call JULIE (1-800-892-0123) before you dig
- 2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- 3. Respect the marks
- 4. Dig with care


Spring & Summer Safety Tips

Stormwater Management and Pollution Prevention Update

The Village has a number of stormwater detention facilities around town. Their function is to hold water when heavy rainstorms occur. They are designed to hold the rainwater, which is greater than the capacity of the storm sewer system and release the water, once the rain stops.

Detention facilities are very important to the stormwater control system, which helps to reduce or eliminate flooding. Mayor Kyle R. Hastings instituted a plan to develop this safety precaution, when he was first elected, in 1993. In order for the stormwater management system to continue being viable, your Public Works Department performs maintenance on a regular basis.

You can assist this maintenance process by contacting the Village when you notice debris accumulations in the detention areas or storm sewer inlets, which become clogged with leaves or other debris. Working together, we can continue to keep Orland Hills the "Best Kept Secret in the Southwest".

According to FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), some property is located within the boundaries of the floodplain as established by this federal agency. The Village of Orland Hills wants to make you aware of these flood hazards, what the

The guide is filled with additional information on flood proofing, protection and prevention along with information on wetlands and water quality issues. Guides are also available for reference in the plumbing aisle of your local hardware store, Park Ace Hardware Orland Hills and Tinley Park, as well as, Home Depot in Orland Park.
