Mayor Hastings Announces Completion Of Resurfacing

Mayor Hastings and the Village Board are pleased to announce the recent completion of the Haven Avenue resurface from 167th Street to 169th Place. Additional strip patching was also completed on 90th Avenue, 91st Avenue and 92nd Avenue.

The re-surfacing project was funded with Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) funds received from the State of Illinois. MFT funds have been reduced in recent months due to the political impasse in Springfield. As the funds are released to the Village, additional streets will be re-surfaced in the Village.

The Haven Avenue re-surface complements the new waterlines and fireplugs that have recently been installed as part of the Illinois American Water Fernway project. Even though the Haven Avenue re-surfacing and patching are just part of the many streets that need to be re-surfaced in the Village of Orland Hills, even a small effort like this improves the neighborhood quality and safety for you as a resident and helps to maintain and improve property values.

Mayor Hastings added that "I have asked for more money from the State of Illinois for additional road rehabilitation. Let's see when the funds will continue to flow?" Let's all keep our speed down on Haven Avenue and enjoy the roadway.













Mayor Hastings Gives Lesson in Leadership

The early morning hours of June 15th found the Village of Orland Hills in a bit of a crisis. The village was without water and temperatures were expected to be near 90 degrees.

Complicating the matter was the fact that our water provider, Illinois American Water, was already out working on two minor breaks in town. There was much uncertainty as to when or if the water would be back on that day.

When the Mayor was advised of the incident at approximately 5:30 a.m., he personally went to the home of our area representative to find out how long the village would be without water and what could be done to assist our residents.

The Mayor then ordered all department heads to the village hall and set up an emergency operating center. He ordered the public works department to contact Walmart and purchased every case of bottled water in the store.

Illinois American Water also sent several truckloads of water. Additionally, the Orland Fire Protection District went to Costco and purchased water. Next the Mayor drafted a letter to inform the residents exactly what was taking place with our water. Public works and police personnel then delivered the letter and bottled water to every home effected.

After making sure the residents had drinking water, he then focused on the businesses. Any business that served food would not be able to operate without water because of the health code.

He personally began delivering five gallon water bottles to those businesses so they would be able to operate while crews fixed the problem. He was concerned that the businesses would lose revenue if they weren't allowed to open.

Fortunately, Illinois American Water was able to resolve the issue without much inconvenience to the residents. The residents of Orland Hills benefitted from the leadership of a concerned Mayor.

Mayor Hastings Secures Grant for Safe Route to Schools



Children headed back to school are much safer this year thanks to the efforts of Mayor Kyle Hastings. The Mayor was able to secure a grant from the Safe Routes to School Foundation.

The foundation promotes children walking and biking to school by providing safe routes and equipment to municipalities. The grant process is competitive and the Mayor was specific as to what the village needed to keep the children safe.

The grant was administered in several phases. The village was able to purchase two portable speed trailers. These trailers will be maintained by the police department and used in school zones during arrival and departure times. They will also be used in the residential areas when complaints of speeding vehicles are received.

Additionally, the village purchased three smaller portable speed signs. These signs will be given to the three elementary schools that residents attend.

Joseph Cardinal Bernadin School, Fernway School, and Christian Hills School will each be given a portable speed sign to assist them with traffic control.

Those signs will become the property of the school and be maintained by the school.

Traffic Safety

Mayor Kyle Hastings and the Orland Hills Police Department are committed to the safety of our residents. Accordingly, the Mayor is asking residents to please exercise caution while driving.

Many of our residents are very lax about coming to a complete stop at stop signs and exceeding the posted speed limits. Many drivers are driving while distracted.

Distracted driving isn't just using your cell phone while driving. It's any activity that takes your focus off of driving. Eating, drinking, and or applying makeup while driving are all considered actions that constitute distracted driving.

The police department will strictly enforce traffic violations. Please drive safely.

Thanks To Tree Grant Money, Meadowview Drive Will Receive Trees

Mayor Hastings and the Village Board announced at a September board that the Village is the recipient of a \$13,300.00 grant from the Great Lakes/Morton Arboretum Initiative. The money will allow the Village to purchase and plant 40-45 new trees in 2016. Several varieties and species will be planted in the Meadowview Drive parkway.

Meadowview Drive serves as a major east-west connection from 88th Avenue to 94th Avenue. It is a scenic street that borders the beautiful Ashbourne Lake walking path and nature area.

Over 50 trees have been removed on Meadowview due to the emerald ash borer infestation. Because of the pest, more than 500 trees have been removed over the past two years throughout the Village by the Public Works Department and outside tree removal services.

Village Policy On Mailboxes

All mailboxes are owned and maintained by the property owner.

All mailboxes must meet the United States Postal Service (USPS) requirements.

- The front of the mailbox should not extend past the curb.
- The post must be firmly set in the ground and not be cracked, rotted or rusted.
- The box must be attached securely to the post.

Mailboxes must be built and maintained to contend with all weather conditions. Snow removal is considered incidental for winter weather. If built properly, mailboxes should withstand the snow coming off the plow.

Damaged mailboxes will ONLY be replaced by Public Works if our snowplow hits the mailbox directly. If the mailbox is damaged due to the snow coming off the plow, we WILL NOT replace it.

Please Do Not Feed The Wildlife

The Orland Hills Recreation Department would respectfully request that all residents do not feed the wildlife. This rule will be strictly enforced by the Orland Hills Police

Do Not Dump Lawn Clippings

Nice weather is still with us!! Please remember that when you are cutting your lawn, the Public Works Department requests residents not to dump lawn clippings or any other debris in or around retention ponds or Village lakes. When debris is dumped, it blocks the water flow, which can result in flooding! If a resident should witness anyone dumping such debris, please call the Village Hall or Police Department. You can remain anonymous but give the address of the person or persons dumping debris, so a warning can be issued. We all need to take a part in keeping our Village clean of debris and the storm water flowing to prevent flooding. Your help is much appreciated.

Dial-A-Ride Service Orland Hills Residents Only



Our bus driver will pick you up at your residence and bring you to any site within the Orland Hills service area for only a \$1.00. This goes for **ALL residents over 16 years of age**! Under 16yrs of age you must be accompanied by an adult. You must request service 24 hours in advance. Seniors 65 and older are **ABSOLUTELY FREE**. The service area is 135th Street on the North, Oak Park Avenue on the East, Interstate-80 on the South, and Will-Cook Road on the West. 

Dear Resident,

In the Village of Orland Hills it is prohibited to alter side and rear yard drainage easements and swales. The easements and swales are engineered to carry storm water to sewers and detention ponds. The elevations and grades are to be left as they were originally intended. Except for grass, no other landscaping, gardens, or building is allowed. Easements and swales that were altered should be returned to their original and intended condition.

All work over \$100.00 in value requires a permit. Examples of projects that require permits include fences, sheds, pools, decks, patios, walks, sprinkler systems, retaining walls and driveways. Any additions or alterations in electrical or plumbing work must be installed to code and also requires a permit.

Pet License Information

Did you know a pet license is required?

All residents that own dogs and cats over four months of age need to get a pet license tag for their pet. Just bring the valid rabies vaccination certificate from a registered veterinarian showing the animal has been inoculated. Fees are as follows:


Spayed or Neutered \$2.50 Not Spayed or Not Neutered \$4.00

It is hereby declared a nuisance and shall be unlawful for any person to own more than five (5) dogs, or any combination of dogs and cats totaling five (5).





The Orland Hills Recreation Department is proud to host our 22nd Annual Turkey Trot 1 Mile/5K Run. The courses are certified by the State of Illinois and are Chip Timed. Pick up race packets between 7:30am-9:45am the morning of the race at the Orland Hills Community Center. Registration closes 15 minutes prior to start of each race. The 1 Mile race will start promptly at 9:00am and the 5K Open Race will begin at 10:00am. The entry fee is \$25.00 for pre-registered entries (ends on Thursday, November 19th) and \$30.00 after November 19th.

Various race classifications range from 6-12 years for the 1 Mile Race and 9 years and under to 70 years and over for the 5K Race. Awards are presented to the overall winners for men and women, along with 1st through 3rd place winners in each running classification. Call Julie Before You Dig

Today, more utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. With this in mind, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before any digging projects and stressing safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."



Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mailbox post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE, Inc. promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the entire state of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

- 1. Call **JULIE (1-800-892-0123)** before you dig
- 2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- 3. Respect the marks
- 4. Dig with care

Be Prepared For Fall/Winter Storms

Most of Orland Hills' flooding and drainage problems occur during and after heavy storms. These can happen at any time. There are many things that can be done to prepare for the storm and the water problem that may follow.

Here are some things to do:

- Keep ditches, drainage swales, detention basins and storm sewer inlets clear of debris.
- Check with the Building Department to determine if you are in a mapped floodplain or if there is a history of flood problems in your areas. The Building Department can be visited at Village Hall or reached by calling 349-4887.
- Ask the Building Department about how you can protect yourself from your water problem.
- During a rain, keep tuned to local radio or television stations to see if there is a tornado or flash flooding hazard.



Flood Safety

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Use a pole or stick to ensure that the ground is still there before you go through an area where the water is not flowing.

Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else.

Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out.

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to the Police Department at 349-4334.



Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns, or an open flame unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.

Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline-powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Charcoal fumes are exceptionally deadly. Cook with charcoal only outdoors.

Clean everything that got wet. Floodwaters have picked up sewage and chemicals from roads, farms, factories, and

storage buildings. Spoiled food, flooded cosmetics, and medicine can be health hazards. When in doubt, throw them out.

Take good care of yourself. Take good care of yourself. Recovering from a flood is a big job. It is tough on both the body and the spirit and the effects a disaster has on you and your family may last a long time. Keep your eyes open for signs of anxiety, stress, and fatigue in you and your family.

Fall Safety Tips

Fall is a beautiful time of year. The leaves change colors, the holidays are approaching and fireplaces and fire pits are so warm and inviting.

It's also a great time to remember to practice the safety tips we have learned. As a reminder, here are some fall safety tips.

Driving: With hours of daylight decreasing and inclement weather a frequent occurrence, it is a time for drivers to pay a little more attention to road and traffic conditions.

Slow down! The faster you drive, especially on wet, slippery roads, the longer it takes to stop your vehicle.

Turn on your headlights! Many cars today are equipped with day time running lights. If yours isn't one of them, get in the habit of turning on your headlights. It allows you to see hazards more clearly and other drivers to see you.

Buckle Up! Most drivers do this regularly, but everyone should use their seatbelt. Using your seatbelt is the best protection against injury in a collision or sudden stop.

Put the phone down! Texting while driving is against the law. Even if you use a hands free device, studies have shown that just talking on the phone is a driver distraction.

Safety at home is important too. Practice these home safety tips to keep your family safe.

Service your furnace! Call a qualified service technician to check your furnace. A certified technician can find leaks and other problems that if left undetected can cause fires, injuries, and even death.

Check your smoke detectors! Fall is a good time to test your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Change your batteries every year.

Practice fireplace safety! When using your fireplace always be sure the flu is open before starting a fire. Use a fireplace screen to prevent sparks from entering the home and to keep pets away from the fire.

Watch what your children do online! Technology is a wonderful thing for business and pleasure. It's also a way for criminals to steal your personal information. They also use it to lure unsuspecting children!

Use parental blocks or better yet, check the computer yourself to make sure the sites your child is visiting are acceptable. Many sex offenders use the internet to prey on children.

Check the sex offender websites! Knowledge is power. Talk to your children about safety and warn them about predators. As parents, we need to do all we can to protect our children.

- Yard waste Please use your yard waste can or yard waste bags. Please come to the Village Hall to get your free yard waste stickers. Yard Waste ends November 27th! This will be the last day until Spring.
