Another Year With A Balanced Budget

Mayor Kyle R. Hastings introduced an unprecedented 19th balanced budget to the Village Board. On April 25, 2012 the Trustees voted unanimously to approve the budget for the upcoming fiscal year. This is the longest consecutive series of balanced budgets, in Orland Hills' history.

While we have experienced one of the worst economic times in Illinois history and our nation; the State of Illinois continues to delay payments and cut back funding to towns. Municipalities have cut back on programs and services to accommodate the revenue shortfalls. In fact, most governments have

cut hundreds of thousands of dollars from their budgets.

Mayor Hastings said, "We have planned infrastructure improvements, innovative programs and maintained high quality services, during this depressed economy. We will continue to be fiscally prudent with our budget, year after year!"

"I am very proud to balance our Village's budget for every consecutive year, while I have been in office. It clearly shows we can run our Village like a successful business," Mayor Hastings added.

Orland Hills Residents Electric Costs Going Down

In March, Mayor Kyle R. Hastings introduced a referendum on the ballot, to the residents, to lower electricity costs to our residents and small businesses.

The residents spoke and approved the referendum authorizing the Village of Orland Hills to seek lower electricity rates. This has allowed the Village to gain group "buying power" for the purchase of electricity.

After researching competitive electricity pricing options for you, the Village of Orland Hills has chosen FirstEnergy Solutions, one of the nation's largest electric suppliers, to provide our residents with savings on electric usage.



As a member of this aggregation, you will automatically receive a price of \$4.73 cents per kilowatt-hour for electricity used. That means that you will save more than 25% over Com Ed's current rate for electricity usage. The new rate will go into effect in November. You will be automatically enrolled in the program unless you "opt-out" with the form being sent to you.

Other than the price and supplier, nothing regarding your electricity service will change. Com Ed will con-

tinue to send you one monthly bill for electric usage and delivery charges. Com Ed will continue to deliver your electricity, restore power following an outage, respond to all emergencies and be responsible for maintaining the system that delivers power to your home. Fishing Permits

All Anglers must have a Village Fishing Permit to Fish. All Fishing permits may be purchased at the Community Center, 16553 S. Haven Avenue or at the Village Hall, 16033 S. 94th Avenue. Fishing Permits are valid April 1, 2012 through March 31, 2013. One fishing permit will be used for both Lake Lorin and Ashbourne Lake. Please note that the Village Game Wardens will be enforcing the Village permit. Noncompliance is subjected to ticketing and fines. The fees for the permits are as follows:



Tornado Safety Tips

From Mayor Kyle R. Hastings and the Village Board

It's important to know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning. A tornado watch means that atmospheric conditions are such that a tornado could develop. A tornado warning means that an actual tornado has been sighted in the area.

- When the sky looks threatening, tune in an AM radio station, such as WMAQ-670, WGN-720 or WBBM-780 and listen for emergency weather information.
- Listen for the Orland Park outdoor warning siren system. An actual tornado warning is a three to five-minute steady blast. This means that a tornado has been sighted in the area, and you should take cover immediately. The Village of Orland Park outdoor warning siren system is tested on the first Tuesday of each month at approximately 10:30 a.m. with one minute steady, one minute silence and one minute steady.
- If at home, stay away from windows, outside walls and exterior doors. If possible, go to a basement. If not, go to a small room, such as a closet or bathroom, in the center of a home on the lowest level.
- If in a school, stay away from windows and gymnasiums or other areas with wide roofs that could easily collapse.
- If in a shopping center or large building, look for a pre-designated shelter or go to a middle hallway on the lowest floor, staying away from skylights.
- If you are in a car, leave it and find shelter. If none is found, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert, and cover your head with your hands.




School's Back!

Keep Your Valuables Safe

Every day, people across America fall victim to crimes. A majority of these incidents are "crimes of opportunity".

Crimes of opportunity are crimes that are unknowingly facilitated by the victims, such as leaving your car or home unlocked. A criminal will take advantage of these situations to deprive you of your possessions.

While Orland Hills does not have a high crime rate, some of our residents and people who visit our village have been victimized by a criminal act.

Many of these incidents could have been avoided by simply locking a car door or not leaving valuables in plain sight. Some criminals will steal your possessions no matter how hard you try to safeguard them.

Following these tips may help keep your valuables in your possession:

- Always lock your car when leaving it unattended.
- Never leave your car running unattended.
- Trim back high bushes near your doors & windows.
- Turn on outside and inside lights when you're not home.
- Have a neighbor pick up your mail and newspapers when you are on vacation. Better yet, have them park in your driveway while you are gone.
- Be creative when hiding or storing your valuables. Most people store them in the bedroom which is a favorite spot for thieves. Consider putting jewelry in a zip lock bag in a large box of detergent under the sink. Keep expensive jewelry in a safe or safe deposit box.
- Always record serial numbers of valuable electronics. Take photographs of the items as well. It can help with an insurance claim.
- Place a "Beware of Dog" sign in your yard or window.
- Consider a home alarm system.
- Most of all, be vigilant. If you see something suspicious, or people or cars that aren't usually in the neighborhood, call the Police.

Credit Card Processing Coming to Orland Hills

Mayor Kyle R. Hastings is proud to announce, "New equipment is being installed during the month of November that will provide the opportunity for residents and village customers to use a major credit card at village facilities for most village transactions."

Village Hall transactions will include vehicle and pet licenses, ordinance and building code violations, contractor's licenses and building permits, fees, fishing and garage sale permits, as well as, police department tickets, fines, recreation department activities and team fees. The Police Department front desk, will be able to process all police transactions, such as tickets, fines, bonds, etc.

All Recreation Center activity fees, fishing licenses and team registrations will be able to processed at the Community Center.

We are working on providing "on-line" capability in the near future.

Un-Used Medicine Drop

The Village would like to remind residents of the drop off box located in the Police Department located in the lower level of the Village Hall at 16039 S. 94th Avenue.

This program started June 16, 2011 and to date more than 1350 containers of unwanted medicine has been turned in. The medicine is then disposed of in the proper manner.



The benefit to the drop box is that it offers an alternative to throwing it away or flushing it down the toilet which is harmful to the environment. It also keeps it from falling into the hands of someone who shouldn't have it.

The program is open to both residents and non-residents. No needles or sharp objects are accepted. The drop box is accessible Monday thru Friday from 8:00am until 4:30pm.

Emerald Ash Borer

The Village has a number of Ash trees, on public property, which have been affected by the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) insect. The Village has been closely following the experiments conducted by a consortium of agricultural schools at Big Ten Universities, namely Michigan State, Purdue, Ohio State, Illinois and Wisconsin. www.emeral-dashborer.info/

So far the treatments which have been tested have varying results and are marginally favorable. The Village's Policy on addressing the EAB infestation is to remove trees on an as needed basis. The hope is that science can find a way to save some of the trees.

This summer the Public Works Department removed 22 trees. The tree stumps, from the removed trees, have not been mulched yet, however, a contractor will be selected and will perform those services this year. Be Prepared for and Summer Storms

Most of Orland Hills' flooding and drainage problems occur during and after heavy storms. These can happen at any time, but are more common during the summer. There are many things that can be done to prepare for the storm and the water problem that may follow.

Here are some things to do:

- Keep ditches, drainage swales, detention basins and storm sewer inlets clear of debris.
- Check with the Building Department to determine if you are in a mapped floodplain or if there is a history of flood problems in your areas. The Building Department can be visited at Village Hall or reached by calling 349-4887.
- Ask the Building Department about how you can protect yourself from your water problem.
- During a rain, keep tuned to local radio or television stations to see if there is a tornado or flash flooding hazard.
- Make a record of all your personal property. Go through your basement (if not your whole house) house and record what you own. Take photographs or videotapes. Inventory forms are available free from most insurance companies or you can make your own.

Flood Safety

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Use a pole or stick to ensure that the ground is still there before you go through an area where the water is not flowing. Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to the Police Department at 349-4334.

Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Turn electrical power off before entering a flooded room or basement. You or someone in your family could be electrocuted stepping into charged water. Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns, or an open flame unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.

Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline-powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Charcoal fumes are exceptionally deadly. Cook with charcoal only outdoors.

Clean everything that got wet. Floodwaters have picked up sewage and chemicals from roads, farms, factories, and storage buildings. Spoiled food, flooded cosmetics, and medicine can be health hazards. When in doubt, throw them out.

Take good care of yourself. Recovering from a flood is a big job. It is tough on both the body and the spirit and the effects a disaster has on you and your family may last a long time. Keep your eyes open for signs of anxiety, stress, and fatigue in you and your family.



More information on these measures can be found in the Village's Guide to Flood Protection. Get a free copy at the Village Hall.

Stormwater Management and Pollution Prevention Update

The Village has a number of stormwater detention facilities around town. Their function is to hold water when heavy rainstorms occur. They are designed to hold the rainwater, which is greater than the capacity of the storm sewer system and release the water, once the rain stops.

Detention facilities are very important to the stormwater control system, which helps to reduce or eliminate flooding. Mayor Kyle R. Hastings instituted a plan to develop this safety precaution, when he was first elected, in 1993. In order for the stormwater management system to continue being viable your Public Works Department performs maintenance on a regular basis.

You can assist this maintenance process by contacting the Village when you notice debris accumulations in the detention areas or storm sewer inlets, which become clogged with leaves or other debris. Working together, we can continue to keep Orland Hills the "Best Kept Secret in the Southwest".

According to FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), some property is located within the boundaries of the floodplain as established by this federal agency. The Village of Orland Hills wants

to make you aware of

these flood hazards,
what the Village is
doing about

flooding, and some things you can do in addition to the Village's efforts. The Village is expanding their outreach efforts to include two public hearings each year, where

stormwater management issues will be discussed. We strongly encourage residents to become engaged in this process.

The Village Building Department at the Village Complex provides the following:

- Information on whether a property is in a mapped Floodplain and related Flood Insurance Rate Map data;
- Records of past flooding;
- Advice on how to protect a building from water problems;
- Guidance on the laws that govern construction and property improvements;
- Site visits to view the cause and possible solutions to a problem.
- Guidance on how to improve yard drainage from stormwater.

Flood maps and flood protection references are also available at the Tinley Park Public Library.

Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMS) may be viewed on line at http://www.fema.gov.

A copy of the Village's updated "Guide to Flood Protection" is available at the Village Hall. The guide is filled with additional information on flood proofing, protection and prevention along with information on wetlands and water quality issues. This publication is also available at the Tinley Park Library or on their website at www.tplibrary.org . This publication is also available at the Orland Hills Village Complex, at no cost. Guides are also available for reference in the plumbing aisle of your local hardware store, Park Ace Hardware Orland Hills and Tinley Park, as well as, Home Depot in Orland Park.

Call Julie Before You Dig

Today, more utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. With this in mind, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before any digging projects and stressing safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."







TYPES OF OUTDOOR PROJECTS

Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mailbox post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE, Inc. promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the entire state of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

- 1. Call JULIE (1-800-892-0123) before you dig
- 2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- 3. Respect the marks
- Dig with care
